VETERANS TO GATHER AT NATIONAL WWII MEMORIAL ON MEMORIAL DAY TO REMEMBER 400,000 AMERICANS LOST DURING WORLD WAR II

Representative Marcy Kaptur to give keynote address on 15th anniversary of Memorial's dedication

WASHINGTON, D.C. – The Friends of the National World War II Memorial (Friends) and the National Park Service (NPS) will pay tribute to the more than 400,000 Americans who lost their lives during WWII in a special Memorial Day Observance at the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C. on Monday, May 27, 2019 at 9:00 a.m.

The ceremony will feature a keynote address by Representative Marcy Kaptur of Ohio. Representative Kaptur was instrumental in the creation of the World War II Memorial and will be speaking on the 15th anniversary of its dedication. Representative Kaptur first introduced legislation to authorize establishing a WWII Memorial on federal land in D.C. in 1987. She introduced similar legislation in 1989, 1991, and 1993, when finally it was passed and signed into law by then President Bill Clinton. Representative Kaptur lead the campaign to create a World War II Memorial in D.C. and has always been a staunch advocate for the WWII Memorial as a place to honor, remember, and thank the Greatest Generation.

As part of the commemoration, a dozen World War II veterans will lay wreaths at the Freedom Wall in remembrance of their fallen brothers and sisters.

ABC7/WJLA-TV news anchor, Jonathan Elias, will serve as the event's Master of Ceremonies.

Friends' chairman Josiah Bunting III and Jeffery Reinbold, acting superintendent of the National Mall and Memorial Parks, will offer welcome remarks. The Military District of Washington will provide military support for the event.

The ceremony is open to the general public and we encourage registration through our website.
